
PIETYSTALL

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

O COME, LET US WORSHIP GOD AND BOW LOW BEFORE THE GOD WHO MADE US. FOR HE IS THE LORD OUR GOD.

Coping with illness and suffering has always been a major challenge, through which we come to know our limitations as well as our greatest potential. Accepting the reality of a painful situation and taking the steps to cope with it can transform a person. Dependence on God as well as hope in God brings maturity (see CCC, numbers 1500–1501).


Jesus sought to heal the whole person—body, mind, and soul. He eradicated ailments afflicting one's body and mind, and forgave sins tormenting one's soul. Jesus's compassion for the sick can be described as intense. As his disciples and baptized members of the community, we must cultivate the same concern for those who are ill or suffering. As a Church, the success of our healing ministry depends on it (see CCC, number 1503).

In the Gospel, we hear time and time again of Jesus's being touched in a profound way by people's suffering and pain. We hear the Gospel writers say that Jesus makes their miseries his own. Through the Paschal mystery (Jesus's Passion, death, and Resurrection), Jesus gives new meaning to suffering and brought profound hope into the world. His redemptive Passion unites all human suffering to his own, which shows us how to bring hope out of pain. Christ continues to be touched by the suffering of the sick, making their miseries his own.

Throughout the Gospel that bears his name, Mark focuses on Jesus's great compassion for the sick, the poor, and the broken-hearted. The healer of healers translates his heartfelt compassion into action. Jesus teaches through word and deed that caring for one another is important. Compassion and service are the hallmarks of Christian discipleship.

Mark reminds us that healing the sick, serving the poor, and comforting the broken-hearted are integral to the ministry of Jesus and therefore integral to the ministry of his followers. Our ready compassion and service, or lack thereof, may be a good indication of our willingness to take on the mind of Jesus. Talk is cheap. We must act, now more than ever. Our service to others is a key step in our own faith growth. Can we see the face of God in those in need of compassion, mercy, and love? If not, we are advised to do something for one who is sick, poor, or broken-hearted.

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CHILDREN'S LITURGY: All the are encouraged to join the entrance procession on Sunday 8am Mass. Children will join the entrance procession. The Priest ill give them the Bible and the Cross and children will leave the congregation with the Children's Liturgy Team to celebrate and reflect on the Word which is adapted to their understanding.
